Employer and Employee Responsibilities

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To ensure there is no doubt as to where the responsibility for fire safety rests on the premises, the law requires a **Responsible Person** is designated. This person has day-to-day management responsibility for fire safety and compliance with fire safety legislation in your workplace.

In educational establishments, the designated responsible person is commonly referred to as the **Fire Safety Manager** and is usually the principal, deputy principal or equivalent. Additional staff, referred to as **Fire Wardens** or **Fire Marshals**, may also be trained to carry out fire safety duties and checks.

In large organisations there can be levels of management dedicated to fire safety, e.g. director-level responsibilities, fire safety managers, fire wardens and fire incident team leaders.

The responsible person is the person who has overall local responsibility for fire safety and compliance with fire safety regulations in your workplace. In educational establishments this person is commonly referred to as the **Fire Safety Manager**.

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Raising and Responding to a Fire Alarm

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Exit the building

Upon leaving the building you, and any students in your charge, should go immediately to your fire assembly point.

Report to the person in charge and notify them of anyone who you know is missing.

Nobody should re-enter the building until the fire and rescue service says it is safe to do so.
